September 22 -- 26, 2010 River Bend Campground -- Hiawassee GA Hosts: Bielemeiers and Silvers



This was our first rally at River Bend Campground near Hiawassee. It is a relatively new campground and over just a few short years it has transitioned into a very nice place with lots of grass and landscaping. It has many campsites on the banks of the Hiawassee River and most of the campsites are very level. At check-in and registration, we were met with very customer-friendly folks and this remained true for the remainder of our time there. This was also our second largest rally ever with 25 coaches in attendance.
